It was super to see some excellent barred Brunners. These were present in wonderful quality and, in fact, the champion came from this group. Of course we also had super birds in traditional colors of white and black. What fun to see all of these fine Brunners. Again, our thanks to Frank Barrachina for judging the birds for us.

Scott Adams is unable to continue as the Midwest District Director but we do thank him for his efforts in behalf of the club. So we note a change in our club leadership with Carlin Wisenhunt taking over the Midwest District. Carlin is an avid breeder of Brunners and we are grateful for his willingness to help out. Those of you in the Midwest District please introduce yourselves to Carlin and don't be afraid to ask for his help and advice.

From the Vice-President Fred Maenpa

The calendar says October but Southern California is still looking forward to the cool fall temps. This past week we experienced record setting temps almost every single day. The past few days have

been at, or above, 100 degrees. As dry as the last few years have been in California we are hoping for some rain and a much cooler winter, as the forecasters are promising. Only time will tell.

After a late start to my 2015 breeding season I am very happy with the young birds that are now beginning to develop and starting to show some promise. In addition to my Brunners I am beginning to see a very nice group of Holle, Marchenero, Hana, and a few white French Pouters, as well. Can't wait for the molting to come to an end and start selecting my Pageant show team and a few replacement breeders for next year.

Next week will be the first major show of the season and many AFBCC members will head north to the Great Western in Watsonville, California. The show normally draws around 1,800 birds, maybe 200/250 Pouters, and possibility 75 or more Brunners. The AFBCC should be well represented as I expect to see our AFBCC President Layne Gardner, Western Director Cory Hayes and his son Connor, Jim Clinton, Jeff Young, Leon Stephens, Jim Symington, our Sec/Treas. Mike Hughes, Sieglinde Tate, and Charlie Rowe showing birds, or in attendance. Following the show I will write a brief report and include a few photos for Bob to include in this bulletin. The Great Western Show is the Western District meet for 2015.

After returning home from the Great Western my focus must switch to the Pageant of Pigeons. This year the Pageant will be held November 19-21, 2015 and all AFBCC "email" members should have received the Pageant Premium Book approx. 3 to 4 weeks ago. Remember, the entry deadline is November 2nd and our Brunner entry should once again be over 100 birds. Let me know if you have any questions, or if I can be of assistance if you plan to attend, but will not showing.

The AFBCC awards for 2015 and the 2016 National have been purchased and will be in the hands of the directors, or members in charge for their district shows, in the very near future. The following awards were ordered and will be used as follows:

Four District Champion Awards will be sent out in 2015. Bob will receive two, one for the National Young Bird Show and one for his Eastern District Meet. John DeCarlo Jr. will deliver them to Bob at the National Young Bird Show. The 2015 Midwest award was sent to Gerald Butler for Champion Brunner at the Shawnee, Ok show. Gerald will be serving as the Brunner judge at Shawnee so will bring the award with him to the show. I will deliver the Championship award to the Great Western as that will be the Western District Meet in 2015.

Three awards were ordered for both the 2015 Pageant and the 2016 National. We will offer three awards at each of the two "major shows", one for Champion, a second for Reserve Champion, and the third for the Junior Champion, a Brunner fancier under the age of 18. The National awards were given to Layne for delivery in January and I will hang on to the three for the November Pageant of Pigeons.

A couple pictures of the AFBCC awards should be included in this bulletin. Let me know what you think and good luck at the coming shows.

In closing, I would like to wish everyone the best as 2015 draws to a close. I hope your 2015 show season turns out to be a success and that the winter ahead is kind to you and your birds. Have a great Holiday Season and let's all stay in touch. Let's continue promoting our Brunners and continue to help one another as much as possible. Thanks for being a part of the AFBCC and I hope to see many of you at one of our club sponsored shows in the near future.

This is the first time I have had any of my white bars come out with a tail band.

In discussions with Layne, he suggested that many good white bars have dominant opal underneath the toy stencil. It is supposed to enhance the white bar color. I think I am inclined to agree. I have simply never seen such a uniform and pronounced tail bar. On the wing you can see that the lighter bars are giving way to rich white bars starting to molt in. I am very anxious to see what happens to this guy after the molt. Does anyone have any other thoughts?



Genetic Engineering and our Future

Check out the scary and futuristic headlines. Engineered babies, reviving extinct species, cloning Is it all for real? Yes, it is! All the headlines seen on this page are from reputable news outlets reporting on actual science and real work going on today!

Dolly, the sheep, was cloned nearly 2 decades ago. With the rate of change in technology, it is easy to imagine the headlines. Today, genetics applications are commonplace in modern society. DNA testing is standard procedure in police work and on a daily basis we can find out "who is the father" on the Maury Show. More importantly, we are starting to see more and more genetically modified crops and animals, so much so that there are agencies certifying products in the grocery store to be non-GMO (genetically modified organism). Directly related to our hobby, many animals are cloned and genetically engineered to enhance traits and features. There are many examples and I have shown a few pictures on the following page to highlight the current state of the art.

So, what does this mean for our hobby? What would happen if we could clone National Champions? What if we could modify or activate genes to change characteristics far more extreme than we could selectively breed in a century. What if a performing breed could be raised with more strength, stamina, or intelligence? Somewhat daunting huh?

On the positive side, genetic modification could make our birds resistant to disease, add stress resistance, and maybe even longevity. Genetic applications can truly be a blessing as well as a curse.

Looking forward, I think our hobby can and will continue to thrive. You see ours is an art versus a science, and you can't engineer art. The creation of appealing features in show birds is sometimes planned but, many times we find pleasant surprises in the

nest. Performing birds require as much finesse in handling as they need in raw power. I believe in the future we will see changes, but many will be for the better. I expect to see the overall heath of our birds improve. The racing folks will likely see increased returns from races. We probably won't need to breed as many babies. Show birds will be more resilient and resistant to bugs. With all of the above, folks will be able to maintain and successfully compete with small lofts. They will no longer have to breed large numbers to backfill losses or raise the "perfect" baby. We will be able to attend more shows or races with the same birds as the worry of stress or sickness will be alleviated. With worry alleviated, and small lofts thriving, I can envision increased attendance at our events. We will still breed babies, but we won't need as many. Our breeding will be focused on the art of creating new features versus mass production. What else might you envision?

No doubt things in the future will be different. Pigeon folks don't like change. But, like it or not, it's upon us. We can worry or bemoan change, or we can embrace and leverage it. I suggest the latter.

I'm sure there will be some who discount this article as hogwash. If you still don't think this stuff is for real, I challenge you to take a look at the fluorescent fish pictured to the right. These fish have been genetically modified (engineered) to glow under black light and they can be bought in mass at your local pet store for about \$10. Genetic modification is here!




Purgrain Show at Souderton, PA

As of the first few days of training they have been a little wild and aren't responding yet. They were very tame in the loft. Hopefully they will come along.

From the Members

Carlin Whisenhunt writes — Not a lot of news going on in the Midwest that I know of breeding wise. Jeff Clark seems to have had a good year with both his brunners and voorburgs. Merle Frank tells me he is only going to keep a couple of pairs of brunners next year. His main breed is voorburgs. I have had a disastrous breeding season. Especially with my brunners. For some reason they just don't want to feed the babies out. They quit feeding one baby at banding age, and then quit feeding the oth-



er one when it is about half feathered out. All seems OK, then they just walk off of the nest and go to another one and start over. Even if I put the baby in with them, they won't feed it. All of my breeds are doing this, so I wondered if I have some kind of bug. I noticed that the pairs that don't abandon their babies, the babies grow normal and are fine. Problem is, my brunners are my favorites, and are the worst offenders. As of the first of August, I only have four brunners in the young bird pen. Should have a hundred. My horseman have the same issue, but at least I have twenty two to pick from. Other guys are having the same problem, while some are having the best year ever?????????? Anyone have any ideas? I'd hate to go through this again.

Carlin Whisenhunt writes — It is the end of September, and I have decided to shut down my breeding season for the year. I've had most of them mated since March, so it seems like a long season. Spring was wet and cold, and didn't want to let up. It didn't seem to want to ever warm up or dry out. I didn't like it, and the birds didn't want to breed at all. All spring and summer, my breeders in all of my pouter breeds didn't want to take care of the babies. Many would lay eggs, but wouldn't sit them. I was tossing babies out every day. Banding them seemed to be the kiss of death. I got to the point that I didn't even record the band numbers until they went into the young bird pen. July came along and things never got any better. I only had twenty one young birds representing 5 breeds. At that point I expected to have close to two hundred. I don't know what happened, I never changed a thing, but August came along and they took off. Within a six week period, I banded sixty horseman, thirty five brunners, twelve voorburgs, six pigmys and four marchenaros. It was the strangest and most frustrating season that I have ever experienced in the fifty eight years that I have been in the game. The weird part is the total about face from completely ignoring the babies, to not only feeding their own, but feeding every baby on the floor. Now that I have a bunch out, I get to watch them grow up. Hopefully a few will be keepers and a few will be good enough for someone else.

Here is a picture of the winner, an ash red OC #1023 shown by junior exhibitor Marissa Shirk. 

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
